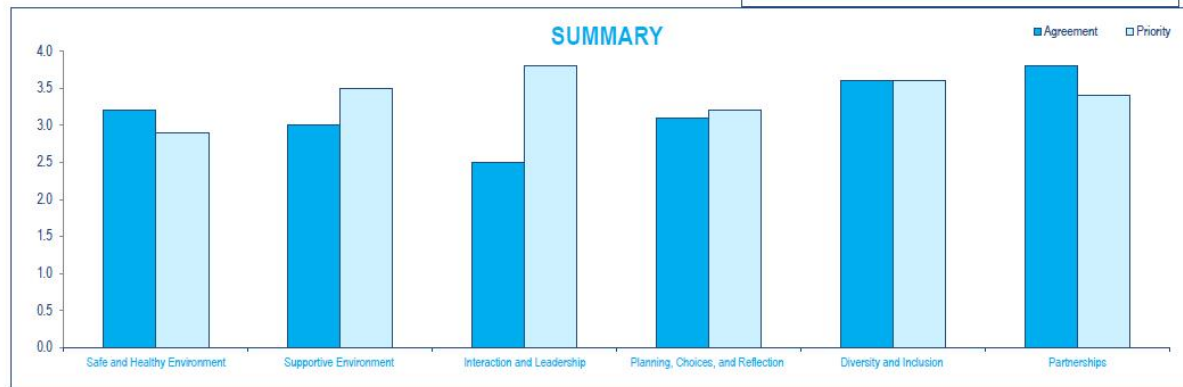

- Have **multiple staff** take the assessment
- Explain to staff how information will be used
- Identify strategies that work best for your program staff (e.g. pair it with a staff meeting or designate dedicated time)

- ❖ SPR will use aggregate results to document strengths identify capacity-building support
